

Privacy Notice (how we use student information)

The categories of student information that we collect, hold and share include:

- personal information (such as name, unique student number and address)
- characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility)
- attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons)
- parental/carers contact information
- assessment information
- relevant medical information
- special educational needs information
- safeguarding concerns
- looked after children's information
- social services documentation
- exclusions/behavioural information
- photograph images and images captured by the school's CCTV system
- post-16 learning information

Why we collect and use this information

We use the student data:

- to support student learning
- to monitor and report on student progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to ensure the safety of our students
- security purposes including CCTV
- to assess the quality of our services
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We collect and use student information under articles 6(1)(C) Legal Obligations, 6(1)(e) Public Interest and 9(2)(g) Public Interest.

Collecting student information

Whilst the majority of student information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation we will inform you if you are required to provide certain student information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Storing student data

We hold student data for 25 years after their date of birth.

Who we share student information with

We routinely share student information with:

- schools, colleges and alternative providers where external education is undertaken
- schools colleges and learning providers that the students attend after leaving us
- further education establishments
- our local authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- youth support services (pupils aged 13+)
- Exam Boards
- NHS (for immunisations)
- CAMHS (Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services)
- police (where written requests are made)

Why we share student information

We do not share information about our students with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share students' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our students with the (DfE) under regulation 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Students) (England) Regulations 2013.

Youth support services

Students aged 13+

Once our students reach the age of 13 we also pass student information to our local authority and/or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996. This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers advisers

A parent/carers can request that **only** their child's name, address and date of birth is passed to their local authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child/student once he/she reaches the age 16.

Students aged 16+

We will also share certain information about students aged 16+ with our local authority and/or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996. This enables them to provide services as follows:

- post-16 education and training providers
- youth support services
- careers advisers

The National Student Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about students in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law to provide information about our students to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Students) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our students from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or wellbeing of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to student information organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation parents and students have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact: **Caroline Ross, PA to Headteacher.**

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
