

INDEPENDENT STUDY – Preparation Consolidation Reflection

Preparation

- Refer to your curriculum overview and read the next section in the textbook and make notes to get familiar with the material for the next few lessons.
- Complete wider reading from Politics Review Magazine online on upcoming topics.
- Complete wider reading using sources such as The Spectator, Private Eye, New Statesman or The Economist. Or alternative on television watch The News - It is important that you watch the news regularly or a political TV programmes such as Newsnight, Question Time, Peston or The Andrew Marr Show. Please remember that all these programmes are available on the i-player. BBC Sounds gives you access to the Today programme or Tod ay in Parliament, Westminster Hour, Any Questions, Weekly Political Review or Political Thinking. Then complete a record like this below:
